B In fact, boredom is a gift. Lost in boredom, we begin to explore new interests and develop unrealized talents. We daydream and begin to form new hopes for our future. For these reasons, periods of boredom are especially good for children and why computers and mobile phones become distinct drawbacks for children and adults alike. It is also in the reverie of boredom that we find ourselves recognizing our limitations, faults, and weaknesses as human beings—the beginning steps to growth and wholeness.

Being bored can be like living in a desert, and that's not a bad thing to do once in a while. Deserts and their absence of anything to distract us become places where we come to know ourselves. It's what took place in Jesus on his journey into the desert. There, he was confronted by his humanity in the temptations he experienced. There, he came to realize his calling and the beginnings of where it would take him. There, in the desert, he came to know himself.

The season of Lent, then, becomes an opportunity for us to create a desert for ourselves. Putting limits on our television and computer time can create a desert. Snacking between meals can become a mindless distraction; thus, fasting can become another desert. Setting aside time for quiet and prayerful reflection becomes one more such desert experience. A grace of this Lent would then become a fuller and more honest knowledge of ourselves—a kind of resurrection.



THE "THREE PILLARS" OF THE LENTEN SEASON

The First Sunday of Lent serves as a milestone for the 40 days Lenten journey, during which we are encouraged to embrace a self denial and God-oriented spiritual attitude. We should strive to achieve this goal by following what is commonly known as the "Three Pillars" of the Lenten season: 1-Praying; 2-Fasting; and 3-Almsgiving. Practicing these activities will certainly help to deepen our relationship with God. Let's take a closer look at each of them.

The First Pillar - Praying: As Christians, we should have a good, vibrant and prayerful life. It is inconceivable for us not to spend any time in prayer daily, if we really want to be AUTHENTIC FOLLOWERS of Christ.

But our prayer time must also not be one that is merely reciting words in some of the well known prayers, such as the Our Father; the Hail Holy Queen; the Memorare; reciting the holy rosary; etc......Certainly, saying these prayers daily is a good habit and commendable practice. However, if we don't pay full attention to the wording of the prayers, we may run into the danger of outward repetition without proper inward disposition! For instance, if you like to say the Hail Mary daily, may I recommend that instead of just mindlessly repeating the too well known words, you can reflect on the meaning of the wording, such as, where did these words come from? and, who said these words first? or why is Mary called "full of grace"? and so on. Doing these things may take some time. But if we really care about something, we should take the time to do it properly, and our prayers, as our personal communication with God, should be taken very seriously.

However, if you, like many others, think you are too busy to pray, then just say to God in your heart, "Oh Lord, I love you", or "Lord, thank you for another new and beautiful day", or "Oh God, I'm thinking of you." It only takes a few seconds to do it.

Dear Padre,

In the Scripture passages about Jesus in the desert, it says he was alone. How do we know about things that happened to Jesus when he was alone?

In today's Gospel, we hear one passage about the temptation of Jesus in the desert. Matthew, Mark, and Luke all refer to this incident, but none indicates that anyone was with Jesus.

There were witnesses to many incidents in the life of Jesus. But sometimes the disciples of Jesus depended on his instruction. The first Christians heard about Jesus' instruction and life from the apostles. This preaching of the apostles occurred before Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John wrote anything down.

Over time, the evangelists gathered this preaching together and put it in written form. Gradually these writings

became accepted as the gospel, inspired by the Holy Spirit. The apostles were witnesses to what Jesus said and did, so Jesus did tell them things that others did not hear about until later.


