

here are two things we should give our children: one is roots and the other is wings." So goes the adage. It is in knowing our roots that we know who we are. It is with wings that we then shape the future—a future sprouting from those roots but also blossoming into something new. If there were only the roots, we would never know life's richness. The solemnity of Sts. Peter and Paul honors both of these dynamics in the Church. It was Peter who was the Rock, who was able to recognize God's presence made flesh among us, who would say to Jesus, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:16).


It was Paul who pushed the envelope, who proclaimed that God's saving love was for Jews and Gentiles—both members of the household of God—without distinction. It was Paul who argued that circumcision was not necessary for a believer. It was Paul who recognized that the Law was indeed a blessing, yet also that obeying the Law does not save us—it is the love of Christ Jesus that saves us.

Many are rooted through faith in Christ Jesus.

Some live out that faith as Catholics, others as
Lutherans or Methodists, still others as Orthodox
or Anglicans. All of us rooted in Christ, all of
us living out faith, each blossoming in our own
fruitfulness as guided by the Spirit, for the purpose
of tradition is to pass on the flame and not to
preserve the ashes.

Saints Peter And Paul: Jesus' Instruments To Build Up His Church

We remember today Saints Peter and Paul who guided the early Church just after the time of Jesus. Both died as martyrs for the faith in Rome, during the persecutions of Emperor Nero in the early 60s, just thirty years after the death of Jesus.

Peter was crucified upside down in the courtyard to the left of St.

Peter's Basilica and was buried in the nearest cemetery which was on
top of Vatican Hill; St. Peter Basilica was later built on top of Peter's
tomb, with the main alter directly on top of his tomb.



On the other hand, Paul was beheaded between Rome and the sea, in a place now called Tre Fontane (Italian for "three fountains"). Paul was also buried in the nearest cemetery; the Basilica of St. Paul outside the Walls was later build on top of his tomb.

Each of these two saints is important for different reasons. Peter was the first Pope and kept the Church united as it grew very rapidly in the years following Pentecost. In the first years after Pentecost, it was the Jewish people who accepted Jesus as the Savior and so the early Church was a very Jewish Church. But as time went on, Paul began to preach also to non-Jewish people, the Gentiles as they were called. All of us are Gentiles. His preaching was very successful, and he brought huge numbers of non-Jewish people into the Church, so much so that the number of Jewish people in the Church was greatly outnumbered by non-Jewish people. It is because of Paul that we are now in the Church. So both Peter and Paul had very important tasks in the early Church: Peter maintained the unity in the Church, which during his lifetime had already spread throughout the Middle East and Europe; Paul taught the Jewish people that Jesus is the fulfillment of their Old Testament hopes and the Gentiles that Jesus is the Savior. Whenever you see statues of Peter and Paul, usually Peter is holding a key symbolizing his duty as head of the Church, and Paul is holding the Bible symbolizing his preaching. Dear Padre,

What does the Church say about free will and predestination? I am confused and wonder if there is any fundamental difference?

The Church can be viewed as the champion of free will, for it is descriptive of God's grace at work in his creation. On the other hand, the Church does not champion predestination. The Church understands



that this concept is in direct opposition and contradicts the creative act of God. It is understandable how someone might confuse these two different perspectives. In fact, some Christian belief systems have historically confused them; for example, those who follow the thought of John Calvin (1509–1564), including various Congregational, Reformed, and Presbyterian churches. But, regardless of the confusion, the two positions are not complementary, and someone cannot hold both positions because they are incompatible with each other. Catholics believe that we have been created by God with free will. In response to this wonderful gift, we are invited to form our consciences and live our lives lovingly and deliberately as people who choose to respond, in total freedom, to the Way, the Truth, and the Life that is found in Jesus.
