

Respect Life Reflection

October: Respect Life Month

From the time we are knit together in our mothers' wombs until we take our final breaths, each moment of our lives is a gift from God. While every season of life brings its own challenges and trials, each season also gives us new opportunities to grow in our relationship with God.



October is Respect Life Month

At every age & stage life matters

Today the gift of life is threatened in countless ways. Those who are most vulnerable, rather than receiving the protection they deserve, are all too often seen as a burden and as expendable. As new attacks on human life continue to emerge, we can be tempted to despair, but Christ instead offers us unfailing hope.

Hope is the virtue "by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC, 1817).

Like us, Christ entered the world through the womb of a woman. He willingly experienced the fullness of human suffering. He breathed His last on the cross at Calvary in order that He might save us. Therefore, "God is the foundation of hope: not any god, but the God who has a human face and who has loved us to the end" (Spe salvi 31). Christians know "they have a future: it is not that they know the details of what awaits them, but they know in general terms that their life will not end in emptiness" (SS 2).

For this reason, a woman experiencing a difficult pregnancy can find the strength to welcome her precious child into the world. A man facing a terminal diagnosis can see that the end of his earthly life is only the beginning of eternal life with Christ.

The Church teaches us that "the one who has hope lives differently" (SS 2). Christ's promise of salvation does not mean that we will be spared from suffering. Rather, the promise of salvation ensures that even in the darkest moments of our lives, we will be given the strength to persevere. By virtue of this Christian hope, we can face any challenge or trial. When the seas of life swell and we are battered by the waves, hope allows us to remain anchored in the heart of God. May we hold fast to Christ our hope, from the beginning of life to its very end. (Excepted from 'usech.org')

Dear Padre.

Why do we say "Holy Mary, Mother of God" when she's the mother of Jesus?

The first Christians did call Mary the "Mother of Jesus." The title "Mother of God" wasn't formally defined in the Church's history until the First Council of Ephesus in 431. Around the year 250, the hymn Sub Tuum Presidium ("We Fly to Thy Patronage") appeared, which refers to Mary as the Mother of God. Why did it take so long for the early Church to decide how to refer to Jesus' Mother? What we call Mary is tied to how we understand Jesus' identity as the fully human and fully divine Son of God. The Church understood Jesus as a person



of the Trinity, the Son of God, who uniquely possesses both fully human and fully divine natures. In a nutshell, you can't separate the "man" Jesus from the "God" Jesus. In clarifying what it meant to say that Jesus is the Son of God, equally one with the Father and the Holy Spirit and yet fully human and "like us in all things but sin," the Church had to answer the question of how Mary fit into the work of salvation. Mary was the Mother of the Son of God; she was not only the Mother of Jesus' human nature. When Catholics call Mary the "Mother of God," they state their belief that Jesus is a single person-the Son of God-and that Mary is his Mother. .
